Dialectical Behavior Therapy for Adolescents (DBT-A)

Provided comprehensive, high-fidelity DBT treatment to adolescents and young adults ages 11-24 who present with chronic suicidality, non-suicidal self-injury, chronic emotional dysregulation and/or other high-risk impulsive behaviors. Patients referred to this program come from the inpatient psychiatric unit, post medical hospitalization, and from community referrals/providers. Training takes place in the Jackson Behavioral Health Hospital Department of Psychology, an outpatient clinic within a public health academic medical center, serving a diverse range of families through insurance or private pay. Comprehensive DBT-A treatment comprised of weekly individual and family therapy, weekly facilitation of multi-family and adolescent skills training groups, and phone coaching, as part of an intensively trained DBT consultation team. Completed five-day intensive DBT foundational training through Behavioral Tech, a Linehan Institute Training Company. Participated in weekly DBT multidisciplinary consultation team meetings and supervision of the provision of groups with trainees and supervisors. Participated in DBT Bootcamp, a didactic series focused on learning and implementing DBT interventions (i.e., acceptance and change strategies) utilized in individual therapy. Participated in DBT didactic seminars with psychology interns and psychiatry fellows to review relevant DBT literature. Provided peer supervision to interns and residents in the context of DBT didactic seminars and group supervision. Attended biweekly Child Psychiatry Rounds and presented a testing case to multidisciplinary team of psychologists, psychiatrists, and trainees. Participated in research focused on evaluating the efficacy of DBT for adolescents and families as well as treatment outcomes (i.e., managing outcome measures, data entry, poster submission).

Child and Adolescent Center (CAC)

The Child and Adolescent Center (CAC Clinic) offers a multidisciplinary approach for evaluation and treatment of children/adolescents with a wide range of childhood disorders, including mood and anxiety disorders, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder, disruptive behaviors, trauma and stress-related disorders, phobias, adjustment disorders, developmental disorders, enuresis and encopresis, obsessive-compulsive disorder, and parents-child conflicts. Children range in age from three to 21-years-old and come from diverse cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds. Provided weekly individual and family psychotherapy to three to five CAC cases. Utilized a variety of evidence-based interventions, including CBT for depression and anxiety, nondirective play therapy, cognitive-behavioral play therapy, behavioral parent training, systemic family therapy, and DBT-informed interventions. Conducted intake evaluations, developed treatment plans, coordinated psychiatric evaluations and medication management when necessary, and consulted with psychiatrists, school professionals, case managers, etc.

The Child and Adolescent Acute Inpatient Psychiatry Unit (CAAP) is an acute psychiatric unit that provides short-term care for children and adolescents up through the ages of 17, who present with a wide range of diagnoses including Mood Disorders, Anxiety Disorders, Psychosis, Developmental Disorders, Disruptive Behavioral Disorders, Adjustment Disorders, Personality Disorders, etc. The patient population is diverse and many come from highly dysfunctional Mariana Cordova, Psy.D. families, lower SES family systems, and/or have experienced trauma via neglect or abuse. Provided brief psychological evaluations to patients on the unit with the purpose of clarifying and ruling out diagnoses and making treatment recommendations. Child and Adolescent Outpatient Services (07/17-06/18)

Intensive Outpatient Program (07/17-01-18)

Co-led intensive outpatient (IOP) therapy groups twice a week with children ages 6-8 with a variety of behavioral difficulties including ADHD, defiant behaviors, school difficulties, academic problems, social problems, and emotional dysregulation problems. Eligible clients were referred from outpatient services or stepping down from partial hospitalization program. Clients were taught social skills, anger management skills, coping skills, etc. within the context of a behavioral reward system and given feedback regarding progress and areas for growth. *Supervisor:* Rinku Arora, Psy.D.

Partial Hospitalization Program (01/18-06/18)

The Challenge Program is a comprehensive, full-day, partial hospitalization program for children and adolescents ages 5-18. Clients referred to the program have typically been psychiatrically hospitalized, have been in residential placement, or are at risk for inpatient settings. Children in the program have serious emotional disturbances, are usually prescribed psychotropic medication, and many of them have endured histories of trauma and violence. Many receive special educational services or are working with the Department for Child Protection & Permanency (DCP&P). All children in this program receive individual and family therapy in addition to group and milieu services. Held two individual cases in the adolescent program and provided weekly individual and family therapy. Co-led weekly process group and led weekly DBT-informed adolescent skills group aimed at teaching emotion regulation and distress tolerance skills. Led a therapeutic yoga-group. Participated in the milieu setting and weekly, interdisciplinary team meeting.
